Two keynote sessions will focus on topics of vital concern to academic librarians—copyright and scholarly communication. Rosenzweig is uniquely qualified to address this topic as he recently abandoned the thriving schol-

arly journal he founded 12 years ago because he believes the publisher had made it so expensive that many libraries and colleagues no longer can afford it (see page 160 for details).
