

PEDAGOGICAL POSSIBILITIES OF CHOOSING FAIRY TALES FOR PRIMARY STUDENTS

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Abstract: This article analyzes the theoretical and practical aspects of selecting fairy tales for primary school students. The educational and educational significance of fairy tales, the criteria for selecting them according to age characteristics, and ways to effectively use them in the classroom are highlighted. According to the results of the study, properly selected fairy tales form spiritual qualities in students, develop thinking and creativity.

Introduction

Primary education is an important stage that shapes a person's worldview, moral views, and interest in knowledge. The upbringing and education provided at this stage affect the whole life. Therefore, by repetition alone, students cannot determine whether a fairy tale is in front of them or not. It is important to teach schoolchildren to take into account the generality of its features when recognizing the genre of the work. When choosing a fairy tale, the teacher should take into account that each work serves an educational purpose. For example, fairy tales such as “Alpomish”, “Golden Fish”, “The Cat with the Bell” teach such qualities as filial duty, diligence, and loyalty.

The impact of fairy tales on the development of students

Experience shows that reading and analyzing fairy tales develops in students:

independent thinking;

speech culture;

positive emotions;

creative approach.

For example, through questions such as “Who did the right thing?” and “What would you do if you were in their place?”, students develop the skill of moral analysis.
