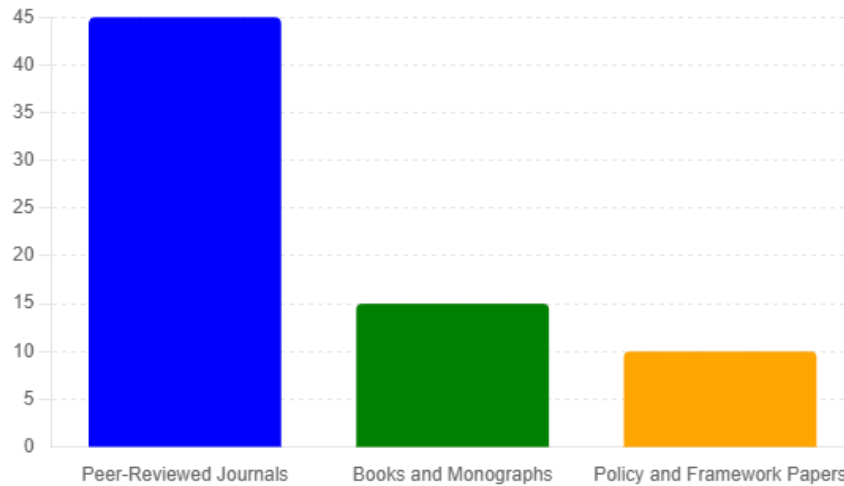


Figure 1 : Distribution of Source Types Used in Research

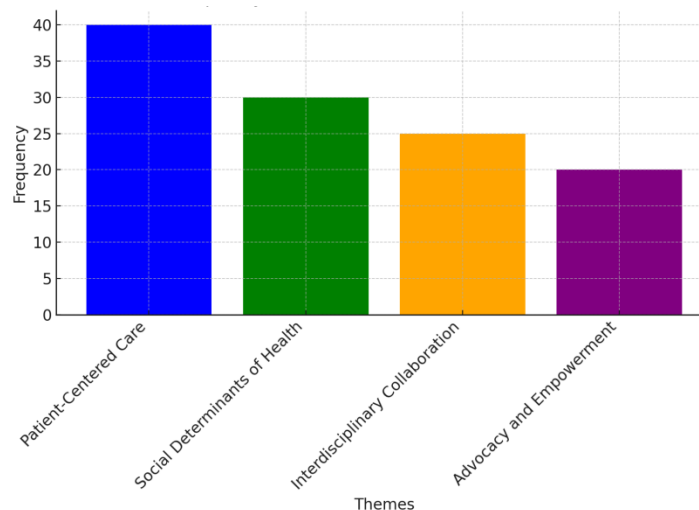


Figure 2 : Frequency of Themes Identified in the Research

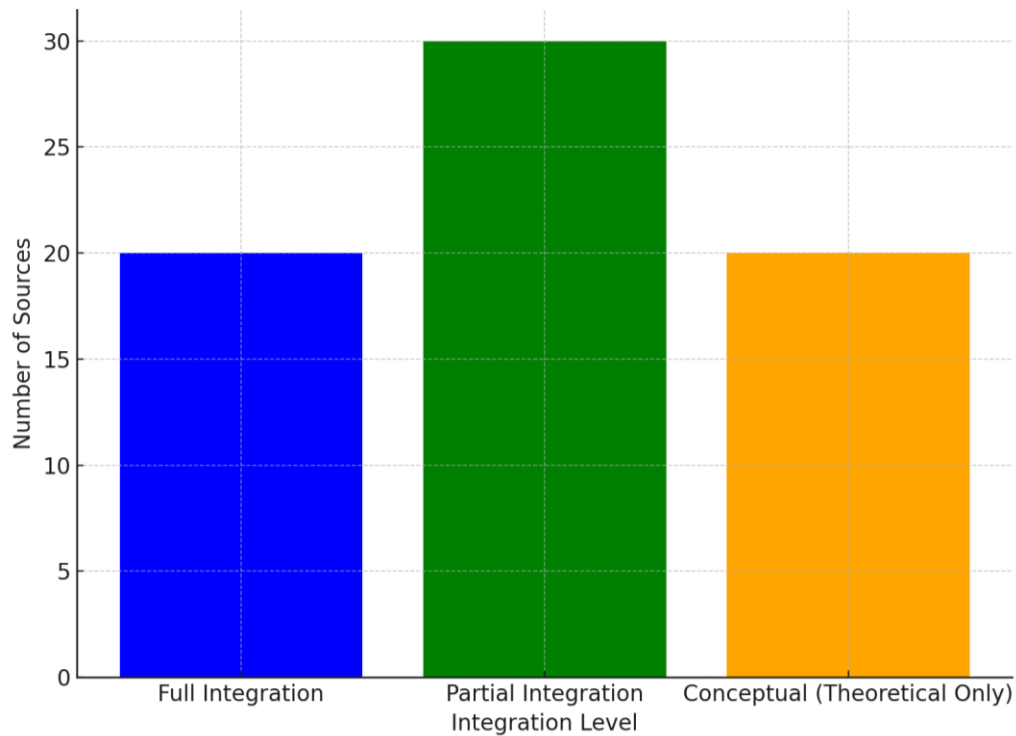


Figure 3 : Integration Levels of Social Work Principles in Nursing Practice

Educational institutions should integrate comprehensive curricula that emphasize the shared values and distinct strengths of both disciplines, fostering mutual respect and understanding. This includes practical training opportunities where students can engage in interdisciplinary teamwork to address real-world health challenges.

Healthcare systems must also adopt and implement models that facilitate collaboration, such as the biopsychosocial framework. By creating structures that encourage team-based care, healthcare organizations can ensure that patients receive comprehensive support addressing their physical, emotional, and social needs. Policies should be designed to incentivize and sustain such models, ensuring that interdisciplinary collaboration is not only encouraged but also institutionalized as a standard practice.

Additionally, there is a pressing need to address systemic barriers that hinder integration. These include disparities in professional recognition, unequal resource allocation, and gaps in communication channels between nursing and

social work teams. Policymakers and administrators should work towards creating equitable environments that value and utilize the contributions of both professions equally.

Finally, ongoing research is critical to refine and expand interdisciplinary approaches. Future studies should focus on evaluating the long-term outcomes of integrated care models, identifying best practices, and exploring innovative strategies to further enhance collaboration.
