This second edition of JNEL begins with an interview of Robert (Bob) D. Herman by William (Will) Brown. Bob Herman received the Award for Distinguished Achievement and Leadership in Nonprofit and Voluntary Action Research (formerly called Award for Distinguished Lifetime Achievement) at the 2010 ARNOVA conference. In his address, Bob talked about teaching. The additional candid observations about teaching in the interview reinforce Bob's commitment to teaching and underscore the centrality of teaching for those who hold college and university faculty positions.

The article by Carpenter examines the student-lead projects in community-based organizations that are such an important part of many nonprofit education experiences today. As educators, we often focus on the learning of our students. This article focuses on the impact that student-lead projects have had on the organizations in which they were done. Like the Herman interview, this article will underscore not only the considerations that you probably make in your teaching but also the need for further research on this important aspect of nonprofit education.

Our final article by Andersson examines teaching entrepreneurship. The article attempts to raise issues around the teaching of this topic. From my vantage point, it is not a defining statement on teaching entrepreneurship but rather a critical essay that hopefully will trigger some debate. The journal will publish replies and comments. I hope that some of our readers will react to this piece for what may develop into a lively exchange.

Finally, the journal includes three book reviews. Every attempt is made to review new books or new editions of books. These may be either main texts or supplemental books for a course. The journal is particularly interested in collective reviews of several books on a topic or area of teaching such as introductory texts in nonprofit management.
