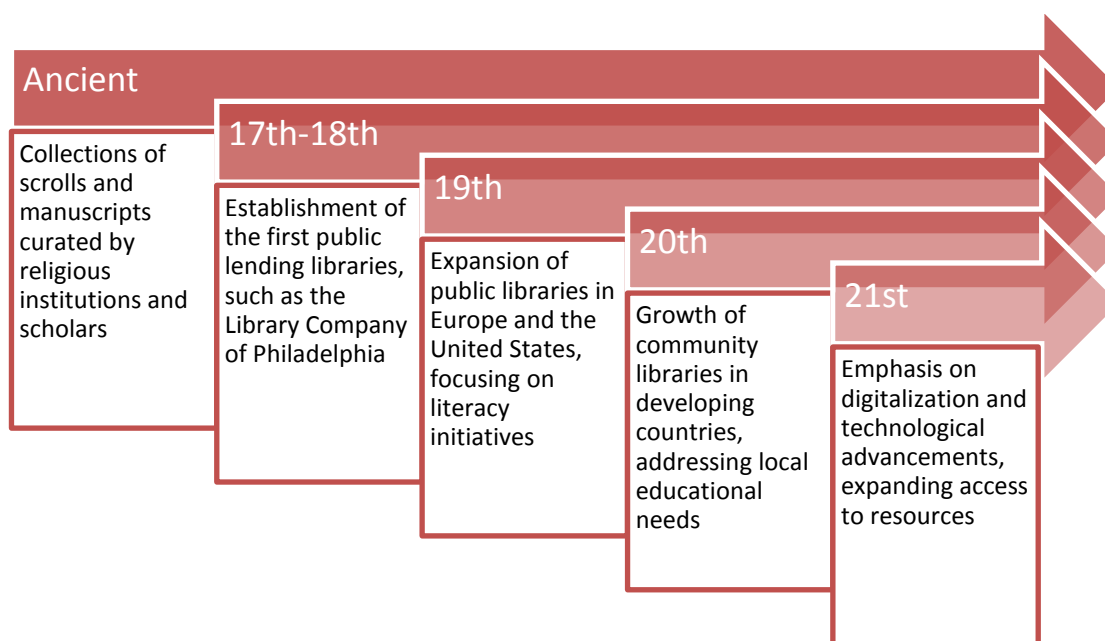


Figure 1: Evolution of Community Libraries
